The Story & You - Tenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Oh, boy. Here is that controversial section from Mark's gospel that we almost never hear because the Tenth Sunday in Ordinary Time almost always gets bumped by Feast Days. Easter was so early this year, however, that this rare piece from Mark is getting a hearing. Let's be brave and jump right in.

The relatives of Jesus hear that he is in town, and they go to "seize" him because they think he is "out of his mind." Then, when *His mother and brothers and sisters arrive*, Jesus looks around the circle of disciples and says, "Whoever does the will of God is my mother and brother and sister."

Who are these siblings of Jesus? The roots of the Church's teaching on Mary's perpetual virginity go back all the way to the earliest Christians. An anonymous author wrote a wildly popular pamphlet called *The Protoevangelium of James* around 150 AD. This uncanonized booklet tells us the names of Mary's parents (Joachim and Anna), and goes out of its way to explain that Mary took a vow of virginity as a young child.

Two centuries later another document, *The History of Joseph the Carpenter*, said that the "brothers and sisters" were actually the widower Joseph's children from his earlier marriage. It needs to explain the presence of these siblings because the earliest Christians believed in Mary's perpetual virginity. Curmudgeonly St. Jerome, of course, said "Phooey. Brothers and sisters means cousins." End of conversation.

As to Mary coming to get Jesus, I totally get that. She knew the Cross was looming, and she was trying to buy time before that sword pierced her heart. You know your mom would do the same.

What controversial things did your mother do to keep you safe?

INFORMATION ABOUT THE DIOCESES OF KAYANGA, TANZANIA

The Holy Father created Kayanga Catholic Diocese in August 2008. It is located in the extreme north-western corner of Tanzania in East Africa, where electricity and running water are - for the most part - unknown. There are no paved roads and a number of them are impassable during the rainy season. The Gospel was brought to this area about 100 years ago and rapidly the Church is taking roots. About 66 percent of the total population is Catholic. With such phenomenal growth in the faith goes the need for priests to minister to the faithful. The new diocese has been blessed with many young people who want to train for the priesthood. The challenge we have is lack of funds to meet the needs for the training. We are fundraising in order to establish a fund for the training of these young people who will be important agents of evangelization in the near future. Although seminary training is cheap in Tanzania, the new diocese is not able to meet all the needs for the number of seminarians. It costs the diocese about \$30 to pay for school supplies for seminarian in a month; tuition is \$1,500 a year.

PROMISES

Today's liturgy is full of promises. The reading from Genesis promises a final triumph over the power of sin and a return to a new creation. The reading from Second Corinthians promises that all who follow Christ will have to struggle. It also promises, however, that we can persevere if we but recognize that Christ is within us, renewing us daily, and giving us the courage and the strength we need to endure. The Gospel promises that doing God's will makes us "family" with Jesus, who forgives all sin and triumphs over evil.

Today might be a good day for us to make some promises as well. We can promise to stop kidding ourselves about our own tendencies to selfishness and sin. We can promise ourselves to believe—really believe—that while we are not sinless, we are forgiven. We can promise ourselves to combat evil and sin by acting as sisters and brothers not only to the Lord, but to one another as well.
